Paughters OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Donna Dull & Val Edison, volunteers at Central Gardens, are members of the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution, Mason City Chapter, having traced their lineages to patriots who fought in that epic war. Even though both women had a head start (Donna started with a distant cousin who was in the DAR and Val's grandmother was in the DAR in 1907), it is still a lengthy process to prove each generation through birth, marriage, and death certificates all the way to 1776.

Donna is a charter member of Central Gardens of North Iowa and has been a devoted volunteer for over 23 years, serving as the board secretary and historian and working in the office two days a week. Generous with time,

talent, and treasure, evidence of Donna's passion for volunteerism, gardening, and learning is found throughout Central Gardens. From her namesake, Mother Earth's Workshop, to the Little Boy Reading statue in the Lily Garden, to sponsoring the Insect Zoo, and purchasing wreaths for the main gates at Christmas time, Donna has brought so much joy to the Gardens.

Val began volunteering for Fresh on Friday in 2018, working with a team to make beautiful bouquets and heading up sales each summer. A Master Gardener, Val and her friend, Chris, adopt the Midwest Garden, a beautiful little garden located southwest of the Ceremonial Lawn. She also serves on the Design Committee and helps in the spring, planting containers and preparing the grounds for opening.

Since its founding in 1890, the DAR has admitted more than 950,000 members. Today, the organization has 190,000 members with chapters across the United States and 12 other countries. Headquartered in Washington, DC, the DAR is a non-profit, non-political women's service organization. It was founded one year after the Sons of the American Revolution formed, partly in response to the many fraternal organizations that emerged after the war. Children of the American Revolution Revolution was founded in 1895 for youth.

FREDRIKSEN Legacy CONTINUES in central gardens

Laurence Frederick Fredriksen (1924 – 2011), a gifted ironworker who had a shop in Clear Lake for over 60 years, was generous with his time and talent throughout the community and that included Central Gardens of North Iowa. Fredriksen fabricated the metalwork that lines the tops of the Nature Education Pavilion and Mother Earth's Workshop. He created the stunning butterfly that sits on the sundial and is prominently displayed in the Butterfly Garden. Fredriksen also fabricated all of the ironwork on the railings, bridges, and trash cans across the grounds.

In 2023, Fredriksen's family generously donated two of his iron panels to Central Gardens.

Several locations were considered before deciding to place the panels on the south side of the Pavilion at the landing. The panels have made the area a quiet spot to read a book or have a picnic. The panels are a beautiful addition to the property. Fredriksen's legacy lives on in Central Gardens!

SEVERAL VOLUNTEERS (Volunteers setting Fredriksen panels) at Central Gardens brought the Fredriksen project to fruition last fall. Larry Adams donated his time and talent to secure the panels in concrete footings. Todd Bailey furnished the center pole to weld the two panels together. Mark Dorenbush, Martin Balek, Dave Holstad, Roy Markwardt, Vern Katzung, David Burgart, and Roger Walston were all on hand to set the panels in place.
