Donna Dull, shown here in her grandmother's gardening hat, was passionate about education, volunteerism, and gardening her entire life. It's fair to say that her father, a firefighter and her mother, a children's librarian, along with her grandparents, instilled and nurtured that passion with their big gardens, dedication to service, and their love of learning as she grew up in Forest City.

Donna began her teaching career at a time when teachers weren't allowed to marry. Instead, she devoted herself to her students, and taught kindergarten for 43 years. Miss Dull was an all-time favorite teacher for generations of students, exacting a perfect balance of loving kindness and nonnsense instruction a 5-year-old needs. She genuinely cared for each of her students, she kept them safe, and did all that she could to ensure their success in those tender years.

When she retired after 41 years of service at Lincoln Elementary in Clear Lake, Donna devoted herself to volunteering for numerous causes in the community. Among them were programs she developed for Fire Prevention Week and an Adopt an Officer program in Clear Lake. She helped start the Community Kitchen in Clear Lake and served on the advisory board of the Mason City Community Kitchen. The Fire Museum of Clear Lake, Friends of the Library, Wright on the Park, Music Man Square, the lowa State Historical Society, Clear Lake Historical Society, Clear Lake Arts Center, Habitat

for Humanity, and the Iowa National Heritage Foundation all benefited from Donna's time and talents.

Her involvement with Earth Day activities earned her the nickname 'Mother Earth' and she was named Grand Marshal of Clear Lake's Fourth of July parade in 2012 to honor her many contributions to north Iowa. She was a life member of Heritage Park in Forest City and Kinney Pioneer Museum in Mason City as well as the National Education Association, the Iowa State Education Association, and Daughters of the American Revolution, Mason City Chapter.

Donna traveled extensively to many European cities and noticed that the best of them had public green space. So, when talk of turning the Central Schools site into a public garden started she knew it was a good idea. She joined the steering committee and worked diligently to plan for Central Gardens and to launch a space for gardening and education.

Donna served Central Gardens of North Iowa for over 24 years as a charter member and board member and served as board secretary and historian. She volunteered in the office two days a week, responding to calls and correspondence, writing receipts, and maintaining records. She also served on the Membership & Marketing Committee and the Executive Committee.

Donna was generous to Central Gardens with her time, talent, and treasure. She built Mother Earth's Workshop, the MEWs, her namesake from Earth Days, where the very heart of the Gardens beats and the cadence of volunteers at work and at play keeps time. She placed the bronze sculpture of the barefoot boy reading in the Lily Garden to remind us that the site Central Gardens is on is devoted to learning and to honor her father, who loved reading to her.

She purchased numerous bricks for friends and community leaders and had them placed throughout the Gardens over the years. And Donna was generous with memorials, frequently contributing to Central Gardens endowment on behalf of friends and comrades who had passed.

She's funded the ISU Insect Zoo the last two years, purchased wreaths for the main gates each Christmas season, and purchased countless plants and flowers for the Gardens, including a favorite of hers, the peonies.

Donna's friends are hosting a celebration of her life on Sunday, June 2, from 2 PM to 4 PM in Central Gardens, when the peonies are in bloom. The public is invited to attend and learn more about the legacy she leaves in north lowa. Memorials on behalf of Donna and a life well lived may be made to Central Gardens of North lowa, Clear Lake Historical Society, and Clear Lake Public Library.
